First Step offers <u>FREE</u>, confidential, and comprehensive services to survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault


- 24-hour helpline
- 24-hour on-call crisis response
- Emergency shelter for individuals, families, and their pets
- Transitional supportive housing (TSH)
- Counseling, advocacy, and support groups for adults and children
- Support and education for family and friends
- Safety planning

- Transportation, food, clothing, household goods
- Criminal court advocacy
- Personal Protection Orders (PPO) assistance
- Lethality Assessment Program (LAP)
- Community education and outreach programs
- In-service trainings on domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking
- Legal, financial, medical, and housing information and referrals

Community Response Program

- Advocating for survivors' needs with community partners
- Working in collaboration with police officers, prosecutors, and other systems.
- Support survivors with:
 - Safety planning
 - Understanding their legal rights
 - Navigating the criminal justice system
 - Obtaining Personal Protection Orders, filing police reports, etc.

is a **pattern of behaviors** used by one partner to maintain **power and control** over another partner in an **intimate** relationship.

*Also referred to as domestic violence, dating or relationship abuse, partner abuse

Prevent Intimate Partner Violence

When we teach skills and create the context for healthy relationships now, we create safer, healthier communities for everyone in the future.



1 in 4 women and 1 in 10 men

have experienced contact sexual violence*, physical violence, and/or stalking by an intimate partner in their lifetime.

Among victims of contact sexual violence, physical violence, and/or stalking by an intimate partner,

26% of women and 15% of men

experienced intimate partner violence for the first time before age 18.



Michigan + Wayne County Stats

In 2021, **70,564** domestic violencerelated crimes were reported* in the State of Michigan

- 24,231 of those were Wayne County
- In 2020, **5,994** sexual assaults were reported in the State of Michigan



Identifiers of Perpetrators of Abuse:

Central, Superior, and Entitled

Lack of Empathy/Remorse

Mantra: "What's Wrong with YOU?"



Why Do Survivors Stay?

Fear, love, hope...

- Financially unable
- Outside pressures (i.e. "divorce is wrong," "child needs parent")
- Children
- Lack of support system and/or resources
- Unsafe to do so
- Manipulation (i.e., belief they don't deserve better)
- Trauma bond (neurobiology):
 - "Fear deepens bonding. Traumatic violence in relationships [especially if positive episodes intermittently present] greatly increases the intensity of the attachment bond."

Keep In Mind

LEAVING CAN BE DANGEROUS FOR A SURVIVOR

Survivors are 70x more likely to be killed by their abuser when leaving.

The first I to 3 months after leaving is <u>the</u> <u>most</u> dangerous.

On average, it takes survivors **7-10 attempts** at leaving before doing so safely.

USES OF POWER & CONTROL IN THE CIVIL LEGAL SYSTEM

Barriers in Civil Legal System

- Court used as a weapon of abuse
- Fear of retaliation; coercion and threats 11. Lack of resources and support
- Lack of understanding of legal rights
- Limited access to legal representation
- Financial dependence on abuser
- **Emotional trauma**
- Inadequate legal protections and/or enforcement
- Lengthy legal processes
- Inconsistent legal standards

- 10. Language and cultural barriers
- 12. Laws not seeing IPV as issues between abusive parent and child(ren)
- 13. Victim blaming and stigmatization
- 14. Trauma Bonding
- 15. Difficulty in (safely) serving or enforcing legal documents
- 16. Safely following court orders; documenting ongoing abuse

Examples of Tactics Perpetrators Use

Before Court:

- Attempt to persuade survivor to drop case
- Utilize intimidation, threats, and coercion
- Increase stalking and surveillance; engage in defamation or cyberbullying
- Employ financial abuse to complicate matters or limit survivor's access

During Court:

- Engage in overtly intimidating behaviors in court
- Feign distress or victimhood for sympathy from court and/or survivor
- Disrupt court proceedings through interruptions or disturbances

After Court:


- Intentionally provoke the survivor to break court orders
- Manipulate child custody arrangements
- Continue
 perpetuating power
 and control through
 retaliation, stalking,
 isolation,
 harassment, and
 cyberbullying

Power Control

ALIENATION ALLEGATIONS COUNTER PARENTING AKGLECTFUL OR ABUSINE PARENTING Undermines the safe parent's parenting Child favors the safe parent and rejects the abilities and decisions abusive parent leading to false allegations of alienation Denies or withholds consent/care for child's medical or therapeutic needs Parental alienation claims lodged FINANCIAL ABUSE against the safe parent as a legal Blocks access strategy to cast doubt on their Seeks to impose opposing values to bank accounts in the child to spite the safe credibility and other financial Exposes children to resources Valid claims of abuse unsafe content, situations, or labeled as alienation by people, which creates concern Interferes or jeopardizes job the abusive parent as and fear in the safe parent interviews, employment, or career a defensive tactic advancement of the safe parent Uses violence, intimidation, threats, manipulation, and ridicule to gain compliance Misuse of litigation to disadvantage the safe from the children parent financially Abusive parent places their own needs above the Withholds, mismanages, or delays support payments and court-ordered reimbursements **POST SEPARATION** Creates a sense of fear that pervades all elements of **ABUSE** the safe parent's life emotional resources of the safe parent Consistently belittles, undermines, shames, and criticizes COERCINE CONTROL the safe parent to abuse emotionally deliberately causes delays in court proceedings, LEGAL ABUSE Strategically manipulates family, friends, or Spreads lies and make's legal threats to assert power and community into conflict with the safe parent control over the safe parent healthy parent and rumors to to remain in control and gain an family, friends, with an advantage (triangulation) Seeks a change in custody only as a means of revenge, punishment, and continued control over overwhelming teachers, and community relationships number of emails, phone Imposes a false narrative to to discredit the safe parent calls, and manipulative make the safe parent doubt threatening, and abusive and destroy their support system and reputation their reality, memory, and perceptions (gaslighting) Monitors whereabouts, social Paints a false narrative, projecting their own issues to discredit the safe Withholds child's social interaction to Terrorizes and intimidates safe parent with maintain abusive parents' sphere threats without rising to the level of of control involving law enforcement HARASSMENT & STALKING


ISOLATION

Survivor Participation



- Leaving is the most dangerous time for survivors
- Goals of separation look different to everyone
- The civil court process can be incredibly difficult on a survivor and their family

- PRE-CONTEMPLATIVE
- CONTEMPLATIVE
- PREPARATION
- ACTION
- MAINTENANCE



How can you support survivors in reaching their intended goals?

Connect- Build trust and link the client to relevant resources.

<u>Acknowledge/Advocate-</u> Express support, discuss options, and educate the client

Recognize- Validate the client's experiences and emotions, acknowledging the situation's impact.

Empathize- Actively listen and show empathy, referencing past discussions and ensuring the survivor's best interests.

<u>Safety plan-</u> Continuously assess their safety, tailor plans with expert input, and address concerns before, during, and after court proceedings.




